of not having our own place. We have scheduled a Community Block Party to reach out to our community and our Grand Opening service was the first Sunday of November. We have also scheduled our first revival with Dr. David Crowe. Our revival will be November 16-19. We begin Sunday morning and before our evening service on Sunday, we will have our Building Dedication at 5:00. I would like to invite you to join us for our dedication service and stay for our revival service.

Remembering the 2014 National Convention



Central Texas temps soared into triple digits as 4,320 delegates and visitors converged on Cowtown when the National Association of Free Will Baptists returned to Fort Worth, Texas, July 27-30, for the 78th national convention, the fourth in the city. The 2014 theme explored "Principles of Sowing and Reaping."

Music Coordinator Kevin Justice and the Music Commission produced a series of unforgettable worship services featuring a 100-voice convention choir, an orchestral ensemble, and numerous talented individuals, families, and groups who lent their voices to the music. Brian Hughes, minister of music and youth at First FWB Church, Clayton (NC), served as convention worship leader and guided the congregation into worship. Throughout the conference, speakers examined critical principles of sowing and reaping-the Word of God as it applies to life, stewardship, relationships, and evangelism.

After Texas Moderator Marcus Brewer taught Sunday School, Danny Gasperson, pastor of Zephyr Hills FWB Church (NC), spoke from Matthew 13, "Principles of Sowing and Reaping in the Word of God."

Sunday evening, Randy Corn, pastor of Bethlehem FWB Church (TN) explored "Principles of Sowing



and Reaping in Life" from Galatians 6:7-8. He warned listeners to be wary of the danger within, understanding the possibility of falling into sin. He encouraged restoration-bearing the burdens of those who have fallen, and urged the congregation not to quit, because "In due season we shall reap if we faint not."

Monday evening, South Carolina Executive Secretary Todd Smith spoke from 2 Corinthians 9:5-15 on "Sowing and Reaping Through Stewardship." He urged listeners to have an attitude of cheerful giving, from the heart, and not out of necessity.

Cavanaugh FWB Church, Fort Smith (AR), challenged listeners to embrace biblical unity as he explored "Principles of Sowing and Reaping in Relationships" from Proverbs 6:16-19.

Home missionary church planter Heath Ferguson wrapped up the annual Wednesday night missions service by addressing "Principles of Sowing and Reaping in Evangelism" from Psalm 126:5-6 and Romans 1. He issued the challenge to embrace the power of the Word of God and make evangelism an overriding passion, to give everything to follow the call of Christ to plant the seed of the gospel. The altars filled and the convention came to a close in the best way possible, with men and women dedicating themselves to the call of the gospel.

Eighty-four volunteers from eight states arrived at the convention a day



early for Impact Fort Worth. The annual outreach event started 9:30 Saturday morning when participants left First FWB Church in Weatherford and Friendship FWB Church in Haltom City to distribute 2,000 flyers and 1,000 gospel tracts.

Extreme Texas heat didn't slow the determined groups that went door-to-door in neighborhoods near the churches and others who cooked and prepared meals for community picnics hosted by both churches. Eric Halleran, pastor at Weatherford said, "We were privileged to work with Impact volunteers to share the good news of God's Word with our community. A thousand people got the gospel today! It just gives you a sense of what is possible in Christ."

Reach That Guy (sponsored by the National Youth Conference) participated in local outreach and service, as 147 participants ranging in age from four to 62 volunteered throughout Fort Worth, supplying more than a thousand hours to six organizations.

Fort Worth residents made note of the efforts. "This is the best group to come through in years," said one convention center security guard. "Absolutely," chimed in a second. "I just wish you guys could come back and train some other groups on how to behave when visiting a city."



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Provows Attend Intercultural Training

Since our last newsletter was published, we have spent a grand total of one night in our home in Missouri. The day after we returned home from Denver, we packed our bags for our seven-week training at the Center for Intercultural Training in Union Mills, NC. Two days ago we arrived in Clarksville, TN, where we are spending time with Lydia's family. Some extended family is coming up from Alabama today, so we are going to celebrate Thanksgiving early. In a few days, Josh will drive to southwest Missouri to speak at the Indian Creek Association's mission conference, and Lydia will stay in Tennessee and help her family pack up for their impending move to Missouri. Lydia's dad Mike accepted the pastorate of Stonebridge FWB Church, a mission church in Troy, MO.

You might be wondering what life was like at our seven-week training Well, in one word, it was camp. The seven weeks were amazing! broken down into three different modules. The first four weeks revolved around equipping us for life overseas. Weeks five and six were all about how to learn languages effectively. And week seven was the culmination when we studied different strategies and tools for church planting.

All throughout the seven weeks our kids had amazing childcare. During the equipping course, the girls learned about cultures from around the world, including a day on Bulgaria. Each week they memorized Bible verses like Psalm 56:3, Proverbs 18:10, and Romans 5:8, verses that all apply well to overseas work. And during the language weeks, the girls learned words and phrases in Portuguese. While clearly they won't use much Portuguese in Bulgaria, it helped give them confidence that they can learn Bulgarian. We were proud parents whenever they were able to say things and sing songs in a brand-new language!

For us grown-ups, each module was cram-packed with helpful information. During the equipping course, we spent several days learning how we can be effective team members when we arrive. Believe it or not, the number one reason missionaries leave the field is because they can't get along with other missionaries! We praise God that we are joining a team that we already love! But interestingly enough, we learned that the most effective church-planting teams are multicultural. In missions circles, our Bulgaria team is somewhat unique in that we are both multicultural and highly unified.

The language course was all about giving us the tools we'll need to learn the language when we get on the field. We learned how to make some of the unique sounds that we don't make as often in English. For instance, Bulgarian has the letter "ж," which makes the same sound as the letter "s" in the word "leisure." Ж is a common letter, as in the word жаба (zhaba), which means "frog." And if you're wondering, we're pretty sure that's where Jabba the Hutt got his name! There were times when we wondered how much two weeks of learning language tools could possibly help us. But then we learned that the average person who does the two-week language training chops about six months off of their language learning on the field!

Week seven we wrapped up all of our learning by looking at some

different ways that churches are being planted around the world. We were amazed to learn some of the different ways God is moving! For instance, between the years 600 and 1870, there was only one recorded case of a group of at least 1,000 Muslims coming to Christ. Between 1870 and 1970, two such groups came to Christ. From 1970 to 2000, there were ten. Pretty dismal, right? But

then, between 2000 and 2012, there were at least sixty-nine such groups, consisting of tens of thousands of new churches and millions of baptisms. Friends, our great God is doing something today in Muslim countries that previous generations could only dream of! Since our family is going to be working with a people group that is 96% Muslim, we were so encouraged to hear that God is already working!

And yet, as amazing as the training was, when we think about CIT, our minds instantly think about the amazing friends we made there. It never ceases to amaze us how quickly people can bond when the Holy Spirit dwells in them. Whenever our "class" all makes it to the field, we will have friends in over a dozen countries around the world!

We're so thankful for our time at CIT. We're better equipped for the field, and we will be better church planters for it. And we have you, our faithful prayer warriors and supporters, to thank for sending us. Thank you!

Leadership Conference to Address Biblical Marriage

Nashville, TN-Pastors and church leaders are encouraged to attend the 2014 Free Will Baptist Leadership Conference, which will meet at Nashville Airport Marriott Hotel December 8-9. Dr. Russell Moore, president of the Southern Baptist Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission, will be the keynote speaker.

He will be joined by speakers Matt Pinson, president of Welch College; Eddie Moody, pastor of Tippett's Chapel Free Will Baptist Church, member of the Welch College Board of Trustees, and chair of the Department of Counselor Education at North Carolina Central University; and Phillip Whiteaker, a judge serving on the Arkansas Board of Appeals and chairman of the FWB Foundation Board. Together, these men will explore "Affirming Biblical Marriage," from the scriptural basis of marriage to historic beliefs and practices and new ways to strengthen and defend marriage in today's increasingly hostile culture.

More than 150 church leaders from across the U.S. and Canada are expected to gather for the annual event. The meeting will feature worship services, practical instruction, and plenty of time for conversation and

Dr. Moore is a widely sought cultural commentator who speaks frequently to issues of theology, culture, and public policy. He has been quoted and published by many of the nation's leading news agencies and periodicals including the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post, Chicago Tribune, USA Today, and the Associated Press.

He blogs frequently at "Moore to the Point," and has authored or edited five books, including Tempted and Tried: Temptation and the Triumph of Christ and Adopted for Life: The Priority of Adoption for Christian Families and Churches. In addition, Moore has authored dozens of academic articles and essays on systematic theology and Christian ethics. He is senior editor of Touchstone: A Journal of Mere Christianity. Dr. Moore earned a B.S. in history and political science from University of Southern Mississippi, a

M.Div. in biblical studies from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. in systematic theology from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

An ordained Southern Baptist minister, Moore has pastored a number of churches, most recently serving Highview Baptist Church from 2008-2012. He is a four-time member of the SBC Resolutions Committee and a regular columnist for Baptist Press.

"Dr. Moore has made a profound impact on today's church," said Executive Secretary Keith Burden. "He understands the challenges churches face in trying to reach a suspicious and sometimes hostile culture, and he offers practical advice for bridging the gap between church and culture. We are pleased to welcome him to this year's conference."

Worship services will feature music provided by Welch College, including the Rejoice ensemble and The College Choir, directed by Dr. James Stevens.

Our heritage with pioneer missionaries like Thomas Willey in Cuba, Dr. LaVerne Miley in Côte d'Ivoire, and Carlisle Hanna still serving in India reflects ministry to the whole person," says Clint Morgan, general director. "The current generation is ready to engage sacrificially, going where needs are the greatest, and we want to be their conduit. We began The Hanna Project to engage in help, hope, and healing, ministering to needs to give a strong gospel witness. This is the next step."

Mark McPeak, director of advancement, agrees and adds, "This effort will require more effective, diverse communication including social media. We hope to engage a new generation with the message that they can change the world and they can do it in partnership with International Missions."

"I am honored to have this opportunity," Holland responds. "God has changed my own life and the lives of many others through short-term missions. I believe short-term trips and projects have long-term impact. My passion is working with the Gen X and millennial generations, seeing them live out their desire to be involved in changing the world."

Holland, an expert in short-term missions, has led more than a dozen trips. His work begins immediately. The board and leadership of International Missions encourage all Free Will Baptists to be personally involved around the world.

Stones of Remembrance Part 2: Freedom



Thomas Helwys believed that he was free to follow his reading of scripture and his conscience in rejecting the teachings of the Anabaptists and

returning to England. He and the remnants of the Smyth group will establish the first Baptist church on English soil in London in 1612. Thomas Helwys was a lawyer and a committed Puritan who had joined together with Smyth during his pastorate at Lincoln. Helwys helped to fund the congregation in Holland and assisted in leading the church. While in Holland he wrote several important works that would express the sentiments of the community. In 1611 he published the earliest Free Will Baptist creed or statement of belief entitled "A Declaration of Faith of English People Remaining at Amsterdam." This work together with his "Short and Plaine Proof" published the same year clearly present that the congregation was committed to the theological position that would come to be known as Arminianism. The congregation believed that Christ had died for all men and that all men could be saved. In other words, Helwys and his congregation were united in teaching that the human will though tainted by sin was able through prevenient grace to freely accept or reject the free offer of salvation. His belief in free will was defended in his "Short and Plaine Proof" where he explicitly rejected the Calvinistic teaching of predestination.

Helwys' experience with religious persecution and his theological commitment to free will and the freedom of the conscience also prompted him to publish the first English book to argue for religious liberty. This principle so foundational for Americans was virtually unheard of at this time but it was an outgrowth of his commitment to scripture and his theology of free will. In 1612 before

his congregation returned to England he published a book entitled, "A Short Declaration of the Mystery of Iniquity" in which he argued for the freedom of religion. He said, "the King is a mortal man, and not God, therefore he hath no power over the mortal soul of his subjects to make laws and ordinances for them and to set spiritual Lords over them...(and) If the Kings people be obedient and true subjects, obeying all humane lawes made by the King, our Lord the King can require no more: for men's religion to God is betwixt God and themselves; the King shall not answer for it, neither may the King be judge between God and man." This plea for religious liberty was not heard however. Shortly after returning to England Helwys was arrested by the king and imprisoned where he died in 1616 as the first Free Will Baptist martyr for the faith.

The movement begun by Helwys and his small congregation would continue to grow and flourish. Though they occasionally referred to themselves as "free willers", originally a title of derision given to them by their opponents, they typically used the term general Baptists to indicate their distinction from Calvinistic Baptists who had arisen in 1633 and were referred to as particular Baptists. They continued to defend their beliefs in the free will of man and the freedom of religion in numerous apologetic and doctrinal statements. Most important among these is the statement that will come to be known as the Standard Confession of 1660. This document will not only be the guiding source of belief for the General Baptists in England for the next 50 years but also

one of the American groups of Free Will Baptists we will look at shortly. The Standard Confession continued to emphasize free will and religious freedom. On free will and the free offer of salvation the confession taught, "IV. That God is not willing that any should Perish, but that all

should come to repentance, 2 Pet. 3. 9. and the knowledge of the truth, that they might be saved, 1 Tim. 2. 4. For which end Christ hath commanded, that the Gospel (to wit, the glad tydings of remission of sins) should be preached to every creature, Mark 16. 15. So that no man shall eternally suffer in Hell (that is, the second death) for want of a Christ that dyed for them, but as the Scripture saith, for denying the Lord that bought them, 2 Pet. 2. 1. or because they believe not in the name of the only begotten Son of God, John 3. 18. Unbelief therefore being the cause why the just and righteous God, will condemn the children of men; it follows against all contradiction, that all men at one time or other, are put into such a capacity, as that (through the grace of God) they may be eternally saved, John 1. 7. Acts 17. 30. Mark 6. 6. Heb. 3. 10, 18, 19. 1 John 5. 10. John 3. 17." Concerning religious liberty the Confession taught, "XXIV. That it is the will, and mind of God (in these Gospel times) that all men should have the free liberty of their own Consciences in matters of Religion, or Worship, without the least oppression, or persecution, as simply upon that account; and that for any in Authority otherwise to act, we confidently believe is expressly contrary to the mind of Christ, who requires that whatsoever men would that others should do unto them, they should even so do unto others, Mat. 7. 12. and that the Tares, and the Wheat should grow together in the field, (which is the world) until the harvest (which is the end of the world,) Mat. 13. 29, 30, 38, 39."
