

replacement to preach one Sunday. He sent Jezer.

Sally and I were pretty impressed with the kid and asked him out to our home for the afternoon. The day had seemed to take a lot out of him and he needed to rest before the evening service. While he was at our home, he confided that it was the first sermon he had ever delivered outside of his own church.

Liberation FWB Church has a bit of history attached to it. It is located in the smaller of two chapels that are attached by a connecting building. The other chapel is the worship place for Iglesia Bautista Libre. The pastor is Brother Dino Urena.

Brother Bobby essentially sponsored Iglesia Bautista Libre and placed it in that smaller chapel. Actually, if memory serves me correctly they met in classrooms and that was followed by some construction that resulted in the second chapel. As the demographics in the area (close to Houston Veterans Cemetery) began to shift, the Hispanic church began to outgrow the Anglo church. They then swapped chapels and the Anglo church (First FWB, Houston) took up residency in the smaller of the two.

Things change and then they change some more. Whether due to movement of church members or the desire to plant a new church I do not know. The reasons don't really matter but Brother Bobby moved to Tomball and opened Free Will Baptist Church, Tomball. Obviously that left a vacuum.

Brother Jezer stepped into this vacuum on January 1, 2006, and we stepped into his church for the first

time on September 9, 2012. Too long you say. Well I certainly agree and am somewhat chagrined that we waited so long. We came in during Adult Sunday School (late, as usual) and he stopped and introduced us. Then he continued with an excellent lesson.

What we were not prepared for was the talent and enthusiasm displayed by the pastor and by his flock. Brother Jezer challenges his group, and we think it would be very difficult to attend his church and just warm a pew. He preaches with fire and conviction, and I think you would have to be pretty determined to just sit there and ignore the message.



We are rejoicing in the fact that Jezer, like most young pastors, has his eyes on the youth. To that end, he has Rolando, a young man who meets with 15-20 young people every Friday night. Here comes some more of the new generation of Free Will Baptists! Watch for them in the next state competition!

It is likely that in that particular area of town the larger church will remain the Hispanic church. That does not in any way detract from what Brother Jezer is doing. He is also working in public education, and I have no doubt he will do well there as well.

We are reminded that nothing will diminish the reinforcement of a very simple truth. Things do change and young people will generally surprise you if you challenge them and give them the opportunity to grow.

Panama Poised to Write New Chapter

Antioch, TN—Director of Field Operations Jeff Turnbough enthusiastically endorsed Panamanians' announcement in early October that they are ready to write the next chapter in the book of Free Will Baptist history in Panama. "We needed to work through a host of details and insure Mission personnel and Panamanian leaders were on the same page," Jeff said, "but we are setting the stage for a strategic and historic changing of the guard in Panama."

Turnbough visited Panama September 25-October 4, 2012, at the invitation of Rolando Delgado, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church in Panama City and chairman of the missions board of Panamanian Free Will Baptists. The Cuban émigré and Turnbough visited many of the mission works of the FWB churches in Panama. "Each established church is involved in planting at least one other church," Turnbough explained. "Several of the churches have multiple mission works for which they are responsible." Following the three-day tour, they joined pastors, seminary students, missionaries, and others for the annual missions conference held at the Chame Bible institute.

During the missions conference, which featured a presentation by Jeff highlighting Free Will Baptist works worldwide, Delgado responded, "I feel compelled to say this. We love, appreciate, and are eternally grateful for our brothers from the United States. But we don't need more missionaries in Panama. We should carry on the ministry in Panama ourselves. We are all starting new churches and we are ready to send missionaries to the nations!"

"What an exciting pronouncement," Jeff said. "However, I had to talk with other Panamanian leaders, missionaries, and Mission personnel and be sure everyone was ready to move ahead." Turnbough talked with various leaders who expressed sentiments similar to Delgado's, emphasizing a desire to continue to work together but being willing and capable of moving forward with the work in Panama.

It is a good time to work in Panama, to see pastors and laymen able and ready to take on the task here and contribute to missionary work around the world.

Mission leadership has agreed to keep missionaries in Panama until January 2015. According to General Director Clint Morgan, "At that time, during the annual national convention, the Mission will officially hand over the work to the national church."

Clearview FWB Mission Celebrates 1st Year Anniversay

On November 4th Clearview Free Will Baptist church celebrated one year of ministry in McKinney, TX. Just a little over a year ago Randall Wright and his family moved to McKinney and began making plans to start the only Free Will Baptist Church in the city and the second one in the county. (Collin County)

Over the past year God has brought together a solid group of people to do the "work of the ministry" here in McKinney. This year has been a very good year as we have attempted to meet and reach people in various venues and through multiple efforts. Let me share a few things that Clearview has done this year.

- We have mailed thousands of post cards.
- We have connected to city sponsored events as a form of outreach and exposure
- We have sponsored a Family Fun Day at a local elementary school.
- We have partnered with the elementary school where we meet in several events to connect with families.
- We have helped sponsor a single mother's free oil change event.
- We have stood on street corners and passed out
- water bottles with invitations to our church.
- We have passed out popsicles in local parks to children.
- We have offered free family portraits to those who attended on Mother's Day.
- We have connected with the Chamber of Commerce to improve our exposure

Through these events we have met hundreds of people and we have had many of them visit and begin to attend Clearview Church. Over the past year we have had almost 200 first-time visitors! While many of these were out of town guests and family members, there were also many who are local families that we have reached and continue to try to reach.

When Clearview began there were 12 people who were a part of the team who helped with the weekly ministries of the church. Over the past year that number has grown until we have now have approximately 22 people



who are involved in the weekly ministry team. Weekly attendance at Clearview has grown from the mid 20's to a high attendance of 82, and we were excited to celebrate our one-year anniversary with 62! Even more important than the numbers is that each week there is a wonderful spirit in our services and the Holy Spirit is at work in people's lives.

Clearview is currently trying to find land or a building in order to have a permanent place of worship, where we can begin to focus on expanding our ministry efforts and opportunities. As you would imagine, land and buildings are very expensive in the North Dallas area. We would like to ask the wonderful people and churches in Texas if you would consider receiving a special offering or consider directing any year-end donations toward our land fund to help us be more prepared when we find a location.

FAMILY: We are doing well. Emily is playing the violin in a juvenile orchestra this year. She is getting ready to participate in her first concert on Dec. 15th. Both she and Marc are doing well. We are thankful that God has put both of them in our lives. They are growing spiritually, physically and emotionally. They are a blessing. Anthony's dad is having a heart cauterization tomorrow, December 6th. We would appreciate your prayers for him. Hopefully, this will help him get to the place where he begins to feel better.

WEATHER: We have had some cold days lately, even a few snow flurries last week. There is snow in the mountains just a little to the north of us. Highs for the next 7 days are forecasted to be in the mid 40s and lows in the mid-20s.

IN THE NEWS: The euro exchange rate is at \$1.30 today. The economy is not showing much improvements here. Forecasts are saying that unemployment will probably reach 27% during 2013. Spanish banks have received some bailout funds, but part of the conditions include downsizing. That means that around the country several thousand people who work in these banks that have received bailout funds will lose their jobs. We would really appreciate your prayers for Spain in this economic crisis. It seems that strikes are getting more frequent. This last week doctors employed under the social medicine system were on

strike. Pray that the Spanish government at every level will be able to make wise decisions. Pray also that the evangelical churches and its congregants will be able to respond in such a way that will effectively minister to the many families that are struggling and may be more open to their spiritual need as well.

CHURCH / MINISTRY: Last Sunday, Tim preached the last message of our series on "The Last Days." This coming Sunday Pedro, a layman in our church will be preaching the first sermon of a series we will do on the songs of Christmas found in Scripture. His will be Mary's song. Last Sunday evening we had an Open House for the Outreach Center. We had a great crowd of 57 people - half of which were people from our community, but not from our church. We are thankful for the continued opportunities that we have to rub shoulders with the people of our community and be a witness to them. Last Sunday was also our last Sunday for Operation Christmas Child. Between people from our church, some who attend outreach center activities and some from a neighboring town where some of our church members promoted it, we collected 49 boxes to be sent as a part of the Spanish Operation Christmas Child. Boxes collected from Spain will go to Ecuatorial Guinea and some refugee camps in the Sahara region. Our church's Christmas program will be December 23. Please be praying for it. Thank you for your regular prayers for us and the ministry here in Spain.

The common tongue-in-cheek saying is that "youth is wasted on the young". I guess that's related to another saying I've heard: "by the time you know it all, you can't do it anymore". Where I fall on that spectrum is increasingly debatable; even though my age still starts with a "3", I'm resigned to the fact that there are virtually no longer any active professional ballplayers older than me. In our office we have student workers that were just being born when I was their age now; in some ways that keeps you young, and in others it reminds you that time marches on. One of the responsibilities we have in our office with regard to student workers is training them how to do many of the tasks we need to complete. Especially for students who have plans to continue their engineering education and enter full-time research, it's important for us to train them on proper research methods, professional conduct, and engineering ethics. At some point, those students will enter the work force and will need to be prepared to step into roles of responsibility, and if we do not begin training them now, they will not be ready when the time comes.

We have a similar responsibility in the church. Our churches and associations have long been blessed by men and women who have served God faithfully for decades, and we should not fail to show them our appreciation. However, those faithful servants will not be able to continue in their long-time roles forever. As a result, new people need to be not only trained in how to accomplish the various tasks in ministry (e.g., preaching, teaching, music, witnessing, church administration), but also trained in why it is important that they do so. There are many people out there with the skills, talents, and abilities to serve God in a variety of ways, but they either don't realize that what they can do is important to the church, or they do not believe that supporting the church is important to them. We need to instill in our younger generations, as well as new believers in Christ of all ages, how important it is that they develop their God-given gifts to serve Him and find a place in His work to use those gifts.

Church attendance is the bare minimum of the necessary training. Sunday school, midweek Bible classes, VBS, youth camp, age-focused Bible competitive activities, mission trips, attendance at associational meetings, and leadership conferences are all supplements to church attendance and are tools that are at our disposal. Too many times we limit our youth by creating a mind-set that a certain activity or ministry opportunity is "for the

the transition from youth to adult if they are not exposed to "what the adults do"? Of course, that means that we have to live our lives as an example of what we want our younger generations to do in the future, which means we may have to get more involved in some of the things we have been "letting the grownups do" for a long time.

In engineering, a large number of experienced practitioners and professors are reaching retirement age, and much of their experience is retiring with them. n order to maintain the profession, new practitioners and professors must be trained and encouraged to continue where their predecessors leave off. Eagleton Named Regional Director

December 7th, 2012

Antioch, TN—The Board of Free Will Baptist International Missions voted to appoint Kenneth Eagleton as regional director for Latin America during the December 4-7, 2012 meeting. The position was vacated when Stan Bunch resigned from missionary service in Panama in February of this year to take on the role of Executive Director of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptist Churches.

Director of Field Operations Jeff Turnbough commended Eagleton to the board citing his extensive intercultural service in both Côte d'Ivoire and Brazil, love of preparing others to lead, and vast training in biblical, intercultural, and medical studies. Turnbough stated, "Extended conversations with Kenneth have given me great confidence of his ability to fulfill this position with humility, grace, and expertise."

Initially appointed as associate medical missionaries to Côte d'Ivoire in 1984, the Eagletons worked for a year at Doropo, Côte d'Ivoire, before going to France in 1986 for tropical medicine and language study. In January 1988, they returned to Doropo where Dr. Kenneth treated patients, served as hospital administrator, and preached in area churches. In May 1998, a milestone was reached when the administration of the Doropo hospital was turned over to African Christians.

For the next four years, Kenneth was involved in various levels of leadership training, including director of the Bible institute in Bouna. The Eagletons evacuated from Côte d'Ivoire with other missionaries in October 2002 as a result of an attempted coup d'état on September 19, 2002, and the resulting civil war.

"Kenneth and I worked closely together in Ivory Coast," shared General Director Clint Morgan. "I heartily endorse his selection as RD and am certain he will do an excellent job."

After 18 years of ministry in Côte d'Ivoire, in April 2003, Kenneth and Rejane received permission to transfer to Brazil. In March of 2004 they relocated to Belo Horizonte, Brazil, to work in the mission church during Jim and Vicki Sturgill's stateside assignment. Kenneth was also involved in training pastors and other church leaders through Bible institute classes. In 2006, they relocated to Campinas, São Paulo, where they continue to serve.
